



THE SCHOOL

OVERVIEW & HISTORY

As John Lyon's Prep, Quainton Hall is a thriving IAPS co-educational nursery and preparatory school dedicated to the education of boys and girls between the ages of 3 and 11 years.

For more than 125 years, Quainton Hall has served families in and around Harrow. With high academic expectations and standards, a broad and balanced curriculum, first-rate facilities, a family focus and a nurturing environment, the history of the School has been a real and ongoing story of success. This is reflected today in the School receiving the highest possible double 'Excellent' ratings, for Academic Achievement and Personal Development, in the most recent school inspection.

Founded in 1897 in the building that remains at its core, Quainton Hall was, until very recently, under the umbrella of an Anglican charity, the Walsingham Trust. Its founder, Mrs Agnes Eyden, established a school that not only had academic excellence as its central aim but also one that offered the breadth of education that the boys and girls required at the end of the 1890s. Quainton Hall became a renowned co-educational school with a strong Christian ethos.

In 1923, Agnes' son, Montague (affectionately known as 'Mont'), took over the Headship of the School. Under his leadership, it became a single-sex boys' school aimed at providing an all-round education for the sons of local gentlemen, catering for pupils up to the standard independent school transfer age of 13. Mont was succeeded by Peter Milner, himself an Old Quaintonian, who later retired after 29 years in post. During this period, and later under the Headships of Desmond Banister and Edwin Brown, the School further expanded, and, with the acquisition of an established local Nursery, it was changed to become a co-educational establishment for children from 2 to 13 years old.

Although much has changed in local demographics and in the world at large since its foundation, Quainton Hall has maintained a steady growth while remaining true to its key values. Children of all world faiths (and none) attend the School, which offers a curriculum of true breadth. The new Head will be only the seventh Head to hold this position over the last 120 years.

Behind the compact Victorian frontage is an extensive campus with a large and attractive garden and separate buildings for Nursery, Pre-Prep and Prep. The large increase in numbers in the last decade has necessitated a programme of updating and extension — most recently, a refurbished kitchen and dining hall, a new outdoor play area and a refresh of the Early Years and Foundation Stage building as "Quainton's Little Lyons".





JOHN LYON'S FOUNDATION

John Lyon's generosity and his clear vision to educate children from the local parish resulted in the establishment of Harrow School and also the maintenance of the two roads that served the area. The modern Foundation's influence extends well beyond the confines of Harrow itself, with ambitious plans to grow its impact even further. The Foundation today aims to provide and inspire education and life-changing opportunities for young people from all over the world.

At its core remains the two local schools: Harrow School and The John Lyon School, including Quainton Hall, but the Foundation's reach has been greatly extended through the John Lyon's Charity, which has grown and developed into a major grant-giving charity with assets of about £440 million, supporting educational projects for young people in the nine London boroughs that are served by the original two roads John Lyon was so keen to maintain. New initiatives internationally are taking the Harrow School brand into schools in China, Hong Kong, Thailand, Japan, and beyond.

Although each part of the Foundation has distinct objectives and structures, they share the same governing body, the 'Foundation Governors', who work individually and collectively to carry on the remarkable philanthropic work begun by John Lyon 450 years ago.

QUAINTON HALL PUPILS

Once mainly a local school proudly serving the families of Harrow, a broader outlook and a daily minibus service have now extended its reach considerably, attracting pupils from a wider North West London catchment area, including the Boroughs of Barnet, Brent, Ealing, and Hillingdon, as well as parts of Middlesex, Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Hertfordshire.

Between 15 and 20 children are admitted annually to the Nursery from age 3, but most children enter in Reception when about 70 apply for 30 places. Offers are made on the basis of maturity and parental choice, with priority given to those who make Quainton Hall their first choice.

The majority of children who enter Quainton Hall progress through each stage of the Prep School and join John Lyon Senior School, having demonstrated that they have sufficient ability to cope with the demands of the curriculum at each next stage and have the skills and maturity to do so successfully. For those who opt to go elsewhere, the most popular alternatives are Habs' (Boys' and Girls'), Northwood College, North London Collegiate, St Helen's, Avanti House, Aldenham, St Paul's Girls', Park High and St Bernard's, as well as selective state schools in Buckinghamshire, Hertfordshire (Watford Grammar) and North London.







Sport and the Arts are vital parts of life at Quainton Hall, with all children given the opportunity to express themselves, whether that be by performing on playing fields, on stage, learning a musical instrument, or discovering the joy of painting.

SPORT

Children of all abilities take part in a wide-ranging programme of PE, games and swimming as part of the curriculum to enable them to grow in confidence and stature. Team-building and representing Quainton Hall in competitive fixtures are important too. Camaraderie and good sportsmanship permeate all that the School does in this key area. The wide range of sporting activities includes football, hockey, cricket, netball, rounders, basketball, swimming and cross-country. As well as an indoor heated pool and a dedicated AstroTurf court on the Prep School site, children have easy access to the Harrow Rec across the road from the School. They also make regular use of John Lyon's 25-acre Sudbury Fields sports ground, which includes a large multi-sport AstroTurf pitch as well as full-size cricket and football pitches.

MUSIC

All pupils are given the opportunity to have access to practical music-making at all levels, regardless of ability. It is the aim of the Music Department that every pupil will be involved in some way with the musical life of the School, taking individual lessons and contributing to a variety of choirs, orchestras, bands, ensembles, and concerts. Last term, the Choir was one of 14 junior school choirs to take part in the finals of the National Choral Competition at the Birmingham Symphony Hall.

DRAMA

Drama thrives at the Prep, and before leaving the School, every child will have taken part in at least one play, musical or choral-speaking production. The importance of Drama is fully recognised in that all sections of the School have frequent opportunities for public performances.

ART

Art is a great strength, as the wide variety of displays of children's work around the School continues to testify. The School's professional art teacher develops the pupils' talents, teaching a wide variety of media in a large, light, rooftop studio. Pupils regularly win Art scholarships and enjoy success in the RCA schools' competitions.


ACTIVITIES

Children are encouraged to take part in at least one extra-curricular activity each term selected from a wide variety offered. This could be taekwondo, ballet, chess, orchestra, tennis, cookery, or many more. There is something for everyone. All extra-curricular activities offer pupils the opportunity to improve their skills in some aspect of their education; they are designed to broaden each child's learning experience and to develop their talents, skills, and interests. Clubs and activities take place before and after school, as well as at breaks and lunchtimes.

TRIPS

At Easter, the children may go on the annual ski trip, and during the summer, there is the opportunity of a week in France. Being situated so near to the Metropolitan Line and just 20 minutes from the centre of London, with its enormous range of world-class museums, galleries and heritage sites, there are unparalleled opportunities for the children to experience the educational experiences and attractions of one of the world's greatest cultural cities.

JOB PURPOSE


- To lead and inspire excellence throughout the Prep School, working with all staff to ensure success for all pupils at every stage of their education and provide them with the skills and confidence in their future life and work.
- To ensure that all Prep School pupils have the best possible care, have access to a broad and balanced curriculum and achieve the highest standards in line with the ethos of the School.
- As part of the John Lyon Executive Team, to contribute to whole-school strategy and management in supporting the John Lyon School mission of offering an outstanding, tailored education for all pupils.
- As the public face of Head of Prep, to lead the busy and varied life of the School by attending a wide range of events, including in the evenings.
- In conjunction with the overall SLT, to be responsible for successful outcomes in all inspections.

ACCOUNTABILITIES

Policy/Strategic Direction and Development

- Create and communicate an ambitious shared vision within the Prep School which expresses the core values of the whole School, is responsive to local factors, and motivates and inspires others.
- Translate the whole-school vision into agreed objectives within the Prep School – this includes the formulation and implementation of the Prep School Development Plan.
- Contribute to whole-school policy development and lead Prep phase policy development and implementation as required by the Head of John Lyon.





Teaching and Learning

- Lead the development and maintenance of the highest standards of teaching and learning, including independent and personalised learning.
 Drive an emphasis on raising standards and value-added improvement through a rich academic curriculum in line with agreed educational policies.
- Be the lead practitioner in the Prep School in establishing creative and
 effective approaches to learning and teaching, with high expectations of
 self and others, including the monitoring, evaluating and reviewing of
 classroom practice.
- Ensure that individual pupil progress is regularly assessed, recorded, reported to parents, and utilised effectively to inform teaching and learning.
- Ensure strategies are in place to identify and provide appropriately for particular needs, e.g., the more able, SEN.
- Ensure pupils have fun, enjoy their learning, and have opportunities to share their knowledge and understanding with their peers, teachers, and parents.
- Maintain a broad and balanced programme of co-curricular activities that develops skills, talents and interests and facilitates the moral, spiritual, social, and cultural development of each pupil.
- Create a 'seamless' educational experience as pupils transfer across phases at key transition points and ensure the effective liaison between Prep and Senior School staff in relation to Year 6 to 7 transfer.

Pastoral Care

- Take overall responsibility for the delivery of excellent pastoral care in the Prep School, ensuring the security and pastoral care of all pupils in line with national and local safeguarding legislation and best practice, including safer recruitment, and working alongside external agencies as appropriate.
- Provide outstanding pastoral care and support within a structure that
 fosters compassion and understanding and adopt suitable measures
 that promote self-discipline and proper regard for authority, with a clear
 approach to managing pupil behaviour.
- Ensure effective systems are in place to support the physical, mental, and moral safety, wellbeing, and welfare of all pupils (including before- and afterschool provision).
- Support the Prep Safeguarding Lead and work as part of the whole-School safeguarding team.

Leadership and Management of Self and Others

- Promote a culture of collaboration amongst staff to achieve high standards throughout the School.
- Lead the work of the Quainton Leadership Team and relevant stakeholders to help achieve the School's vision.
- In conjunction with the Director of Operations (DOO), oversee day-today operational requirements, delegating as appropriate, to ensure the efficiency of the Prep School.

Communications, Marketing and External Links


- Act as the figurehead and representative of the Prep School at all times, within the school community and more widely.
- Maintain strong relationships with the parent body, with frequent, informative and positive communications, and dealing with concerns and complaints with care and sensitivity.
- Work in consultation with the Director of Marketing and Communications to promote the Prep School and ensure its attractiveness in the wider market.
- Work with the Director of Admissions to manage the admissions and assessment processes for prospective pupils in the Prep School in accordance with agreed guidelines.
- Build wider links, both across the John Lyon Foundation and beyond, to ensure that national and international perspectives feature in the School's work.

Management of Resources

- Organise a relevant and age-appropriate timetable for the Prep School and analyse staffing requirements to ensure optimum benefit to pupils within budgetary constraints.
- Work with the Chief Operating Officer and Director Of Operations (DOO) to plan, monitor and control the Prep School's allocated budget to ensure the efficient and effective use of all resources.
- Work with the DOO to ensure that all resources are fit for purpose and used in accordance with health and safety guidelines, and with appropriate risk management in place for all events, school visits, activities, clubs, and competitions.
